

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
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
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# Explore the Bhopal-Bhimbetka-Sanchi one of Medbyo Prodochla many for the Company for the Comp

Air India flies to Bhopal from Delhi and Mumbai

The Sanchi Stupa was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1989 2. The dome is surrounded by a railing and four gateways; each has intricate carvings and sculptures depicting stories from Lord Buddha's life.



s I drove out from Bhopal to Bhimbetka, the fresh air caressing my cheeks, I was excited to explore the cave paintings that provide evidence of early human habitation.

The 46 km ride through the Vindhyan Range was bereft of traffic, but do watch out for stray cattle. A quick stop at the Highway Treat for breakfast, and I was on my way.

"Be careful," warned my guide, as we navigated the slippery path that merges with the rock formations. Standing tall amidst a trail of trees silhouetted against the clear sky, the caves looked magical.

Legend has it that the Pandavas stayed in these caves, and the name 'Bhimbetka' came from Bhimbaithaka, or the seat of Bhima, one of the

brothers. The archeological site is the oldest known rock art in India, and has cave paintings spanning the Paleolithic and Medieval ages, depicting everyday life—hunting, dancing, horses, etc. I was specifically enamoured with Rock Shelter 3, about 39m long and called the 'auditorium'. Enveloped by custard apple and tamarind trees, it has several cupules depressions on stones, said to be man's earliest expression of creativity.

There are 243 rock shelters, of which only 15 are open for tourists. Wheelchair facilities are available as are audio-visual guides. The site is open all days; the best time to visit is between July and March.

#### BLISSFUL BUDDHA

The two-hour ride to Sanchi got me there just in time for lunch at The

Gateway Retreat at Sanchi. The highlight of my meal was the rose-flavoured ice cream, with nuts and the fragrant cardamom.

I made my way to the Sanchi Stupa, situated atop a hill, in the evening via a serpentine road.
Surrounded by manicured gardens and lofty mountain ranges, the site is open on all days from sunrise to sunset, and tickets have to be bought at the counter next to the museum. A solitary eatery serves tea, coffee, and light snacks.

A huge hemispherical egg-shaped dome, 16.46m high and 36.8m in diameter, the Stupa is a testimony to the spiritual and artistic prowess of its builders, and can be accessed via four gateways, which carry depictions from the Jataka legends and scenes from the life of Lord Buddha. A three-tiered stone umbrella on top of the dome represent the Three Jewels of Buddhism. On one of the gates, two square posts are crowned by yakshas, potbellied dwarfs

Stupa 1 was constructed by Mauryan Emperor Asoka, and if you want to know more about the King's life, you can attend the 30-minute Sound and Light show (in Hindi and English), near the Stupa (₹100 per person). A 15-minute laser show at the Jambudweep Park throws light, quite literally, on the Buddha's life.

I looked at the sculpted gates one last time, glowing beautifully in the setting sun, on my way out. The next morning, perhaps inspired by the visit, I sat beside one of the Buddha statues in my hotel, and meditated for 20 minutes. Later, I visited Udaygiri

Caves, 10km from Sanchi and bought souvenirs at the Stupa museum.

**ROYAL REFLECTIONS** 

Back in Bhopal, I visited the **Tribal Museum**, where one can witness the living heritage of seven major tribes of MP. **The State Museum** is another attraction, with 17 galleries on various themes.

Then, I walked through

the labyrinth lanes of Chowk Bazaar, which exuded a rustic charm and is pedestrian-friendly (no four-wheelers allowed). I bought the famed Bhopali batua (small purse with intricate embroidery), and discovered a gem during dinner at Agrawal Puri Bhandar—the kaddu (pumpkin) raita! As night descended. I walked to Jumerati, where pushcarts were selling street food. and then crossed the Jama Masjid, built by Qudsia Begum, the city's first female ruler.

I also visited the 300-year-old Qadimi Royal Hammam, apparently the only functional one in India, and Gauhar Mahal, a palace built in 1821 by Qudsia Begum. Sunrise in Jehan Numa Palace Hotel was gorgeous. In the evening, I picked up some worldfamous Chanderi sarees—a valuable keepsake and a piece of living heritage.

## FLAVOURS TO FAVOUR

A trip to Bhopal would be incomplete without sampling these signature dishes

#### **ACHARI GOSHT**

Much of the Bhopali food tradition consists of meat dishes. A case in point is this lamb dish, slow-cooked with onion, yoghurt and pickled spices. It is best paired with the *khameeri* roti (fermented bread). Try it at Jehan Numa Palace Hotel, Shamla Hills.

#### **MAWA JALEBI**

Crisp on the outside and soft on the inside, this streetside delicacy brings together the best of *mawa* (reduced milk solids) and jalebi. Best teamed with *rabdi*. You can carry it as well (can be refrigerated for 15 days). Try it at Raju Tea Stall in Fatehgarh, from 5am till midnight.

#### **MURGH REZALA**

A signature dish of Bhopal, this recipe calls for the chicken to be slow cooked in a light yoghurt and cashew paste. The simple flavour bears testimony to the cook's prowess. Ideally paired with a no-fuss Tandoori roti, that lets you soak up the gravy. Try it at Filfora on Sultania Road.

#### **DAL BAFLA**

Similar to the dal *baati*, the *bafla* is a ball made of wholewheat, that's first boiled and then baked, and served with a dal that's cooked with a mixture of spices. The dal is tempered with ghee, garlic, and red chilli powder. Try this at Taj Lakefront, Bhopal on Link Road.

#### 10:00am

#### Smell the roses

OXFORD BOTANIC GARDEN

Walk down High Street, home to different colleges, till you reach Magdalen College by the River Cherwell, where people go punting. Here lies the Oxford Botanic Garden, the oldest in the UK. Look for the garden's oldest tree, admire the rare collection of the euphorbia plant, or just stop and smell the roses at the fragrant Rose Garden outside.

#### **GETTING THERE**

Air India flies non-stop to London from Delhi, Mumbai, Goa, Kochi, Ahmedabad, and Amritsar. Oxford is a bus ride away from London.

#### 11:00am

#### Take a tour

OXFORD CITY TOUR

You can cover all the highlights in two hours, including the **Bodleian Library**, the **Divinity School** (featured in the Harry Potter movies), the **Bridge of Sighs** (resembling the Venetian one), the Narnia door that inspired C.S. Lewis' characters, plus **Christ Church College** where *Alice in Wonderland* was birthed. Lewis Carroll first narrated the tale to the Dean's daughters here, in 1862.

#### 1:00pm

#### Get a bird's-eye view

CITY VIEWPOINTS

Oxford is called the City of Dreaming Spires, and the best way to admire these peaks is from a height. You get a great view of the **Radcliffe Camera** after climbing 127 stairs to **St. Mary's**  **Church** tower. Nearby is **Carfax Tower**, one of the tallest buildings in Oxford.

#### 2:30pm

#### Shop and dine

**COVERED MARKET** 

The **Covered Market** is a fascinating place selling everything from Oxford sausages to handmade soap. It's also a great, affordable lunch place: try **Donburi Inn** for Asian fare, or have homemade Lebanese at **Rozana**. End with a treat from the legendary **Ben's Cookies**.

#### 4:30pm

#### **Listen to stories**

THE STORY MUSEUM

Oxford is home to stunning museums but **The Story Museum** is unique—it celebrates storytelling. There's a mysterious forest, and an enchanted library; rediscover your favourite characters or catch a live performance.

#### 6:00pm

#### Read a book

NORRINGTON ROOM

Deep in the bowels of the centuryold **Blackwell's Bookshop** is **The Norrington Room**, which holds the Guinness Record for the single largest room in the world selling books. Give your feet some rest, and sit down to read.

#### 7:30pm

#### **Toast some history**


OLD PUBS



The nerve centre of American history and patriotism, the charming city of Philadelphia is now a cradle of art, culture, and cuisine

he first thing that struck me as my cab made its way through the historic town centre of Philadelphia was the juxtaposition of old and new, classic and modern. historic and futuristic. Magnificent Europeanstyle buildings from the days of yore stood proudly alongside sky-scraping glass and concrete giants. Historical landmarks vied for attention with newer attractions. Family-run restaurants and glitzy fine-dining establishments dotted the street sides. This was a city I was going to effortlessly fall in love with!

Often referred to as the 'Cradle of Liberty', Philadelphia, or Philly as it's lovingly called, played a

pivotal role in the American Revolution and the shaping of the United States of America. The Declaration of Independence was signed here in 1776 and the US Constitution drafted here in 1787. It was a hub for influential figures like Benjamin Franklin. Thomas Jefferson, John Adams and George Washington, who shaped the nation's founding principles. Philadelphia also served as the temporary capital of the US from 1790 to 1800 and was a significant centre for the abolitionist movement (to end slavery). Today, the city's rich past and history shines through its famous heritage landmarks, even as new institutions come up and flourish alongside.

#### A LESSON IN HISTORY

The best way to immerse in the heritage of Philadelphia is through a tour of

the Historic District, aboard the iconic trolleys of Philadelphia Trolley Works or a double decker from Big Bus Tours. My first port of call was the Independence Hall, the epicentre of America's journey to independence, where both the Declaration of Independence and US Constitution were crafted. Nearby, the Liberty Bell stands as an enduring symbol of American freedom, with its legendary crack that is believed to have developed due to continual use. At the newly-built Museum of the American Revolution, I learnt about the country's struggle for independence through the exhibits.

On another day, I strolled through the charming Elfreth's Alley, the oldest continually inhabited residential street in America, exuding colonial charm. At the

AN ARTY AFFAIR

On a more relaxed afternoon, I found myself marvelling at the neoclassical façade and stunning interiors of the Philadelphia Museum of

Art, before losing myself in its vast collection of European masterpieces, American art and South Asian artefacts spanning 4,000 years of art history. Housing Dr Albert C. Barnes' distinctive art collection, featuring postimpressionist and early modern masterpieces, the Barnes Foundation with its tranquil 'Gallery in a Garden' design offered a dynamic art experience. Located inside a mall, the year-round art show of Wonderspaces took me by sweet surprise with 16 contemporary, interactive, and conversationprovoking art installations. For a street art lover like me, the best experience was offered by a guided walk with the Mural Arts Philadelphia for a sneakpeek of the 4,000 plus eyecatching murals that adorn the walls of the city.

#### FOODIE PARADISE

One cannot leave this city without devouring its most popular dishes, including the Philly cheesesteak, Philadelphia cream cheese, and soft pretzels with mustard. My favourite Philly cheesesteak joint turned out to be the 76-year-old family-run Campo's Deli in Old City. With over 70

stalls offering regional delicacies and global cuisines, the beloved food market Reading Terminal Market was a veritable feast. At McGillin's Olde Ale House, the oldest operating tavern in Philadelphia, I met the jolly owner and his family while downing local beers. Lunch at Moshulu, the world's only restaurant on a tall ship, came with sweeping views of the Delaware river, while the sophisticated atmosphere of Assembly, the rooftop bar overlooking the Benjamin Franklin Parkway, was the best way to wind down after a long day with a few cocktails.

# Beyond The Taj

Is it possible to create an Agra itinerary without its most famous monument? Read on to find out

s there an Agra beyond the Taj?" I sheepishly ask local experience curator Tahir Ahmed

Qureshi, as we walk across the sprawling courtyard of the Jama Masjid. Few know that Agra, too, has a magnificent Jama Masjid, built by Emperor Shah Jahan's daughter Jahanara Begum. Situated just opposite the Agra Fort, this massive architectural masterpiece in red and white stone, featuring bulbous domes, cavernous prayer halls, and large fountain ponds, attracts very few tourists.

very rew tourist.

We meander through the narrow lanes of old Agra, climb up to the rooftop of Tahir's home and sit down to eat, with a surreal view of the Taj Mahal from his living room. He is the Founder of Agra Heritage

NEW NEIGHBOURHOODS

Walks, along with Kaleem Ahmed Qureshi and Neha Chaturvedi, with a mission to showcase Agra's many facets in an immersive and experiential fashion. A case in point: we find ourselves digging into a dastarkhān—a traditional meal eaten by local families for centuries. an experience no restaurant or luxury hotel can replicate. A host of flavourful meats. kebabs, stewed vegetables, and biryani, spread before us on a mat. This, for me, is Mughlai cuisine, in its purest form, eaten in the home of a true Agra local.

I spend the afternoon strolling through the old parts. Few people associate Agra with temples, but I discover the magnificent Mankameshwar Temple complex, surrounded by shops selling flowers and sweetmeats. Dedicated to Lord Shiva, it is one of the most ancient temples in this city of Mughals.

#### THE CRAFT TRAIL.


It is said that descendants of the original marble artists who worked on Taj Mahal still thrive in workshops in old Agra. While there are many conflicting theories on this, I make my way to a certain Irfan Bhai's workshop, His family has continued the iconic inlay work that the city is famed for, since the Mughal era. Here, Irfan Bhai walks me through the highly painstaking process of polishing, cutting, and finishing the marble, before inlaying it with a myriad of precious and semi-precious stones. "What better way to immerse oneself in the Agra spirit than to visit the workshop of these world famous pietra dura artisans," he tells me. A couple of minutes later, the Friday call to prayer is heard and the workshop empties itself of its employees, within

microseconds, leaving me all alone to admire the art.

An hour later, and a short rickshaw ride away, I find myself in the home of Rizvana and Raazna, whose families have been practising zardozi for generations. This intricate embroidery, with gold thread and embellishments, originated in Persia but was popularised during Mughal times. "The zardozi you see on haute couture lehengas across the country, find their humble origins in these workshops; it's keeping the art form alive", Rizvana says, as she demonstrates her craft.

#### BY THE YAMUNA

The next day, I meet Bhanu Pratap Singh Dhakar, a local content creator whose platform Agra Aur Hum, tells stories of 'The Humans of Agra'. He leads me to the deserted lawns of Mehtab Bagh, a charbagh across the Yamuna, north of the Taj Mahal complex. "Not many people know of the existence of Mehtab Bagh. It was earmarked by Emperor Shah Jahan for its geometrically-perfect view of his construction. Today, it is seeing a genuine restoration effort by the government," he tells me.

An evening stroll here is highly recommended, for this garden was much loved by Shah Jahan. Just before sunset, we make a final pit stop at the 'baby Taj' or the 'jewel box'—the Tomb of I'timād-ud-Daulah situated along the Yamuna. It predates the Taj Mahal and its white marble structure symbolises the shift of

Mughal architectural aesthetics from red stone to white marble. This monument was commissioned by Emperor Jahangir's wife, Nur Jahan, for her father. Here, the famed inlay work is visible outside, but another lesser-known Mughal art form—wall paintings—vividly adorns the interiors.




#### 1/ MUMBAL

he overwhelming grandeur of Vienna amazes me as I drive to Hotel Gilbert in the Museum Quarter. An hour later I stroll in the Maria-Theresien-Platz: cast in bronze, the formidable figure of Empress Maria Theresa still commands all that is around her and beyond. Two magnificent buildings stand regally on either side, Kunsthistorisches (Museum of Art History) and the Natural History Museum Vienna; a handful of fountains and beautifully sculpted marble statues dot the green landscape. Basking in the warm evening sunshine, I admire the splendid environs, waiting to discover more.

The next morning, Tom, my guide, and I walk on the most beautiful Ringstrasse Boulevard, a masterpiece in terms of urban planning, that took 50 years to build. Starting with the Parliament, passing many imposing structures like the Austrian National Library (Heldenplatz), and through the 5.3km walk along Ringstrasse, Tom speaks of Vienna's history, art, people, culture, and

heritage, all of which make the city admirable. As a bonus, he waits patiently as I click tonnes of pictures.



Now, it accommodates offices, museums, and the Spanish Riding School. This is the palace where Maria Theresa lived and ruled, where her 16 children were born and raised. In the Sisi Museum, there are more than 300 exhibits including Empress Elisabeth's (aka Sisi) dresses, jewellery, stationery, art equipment, the harp from her childhood, etc. With exquisitely-carved marble

Take a screenshot of our recommendations to keep your exploration on track statues, each telling a story, and horse carriages plying in the historical palace complex, it looks like a scene from a period film.

It might be a good idea to get the Vienna City Card, which gets you discounts in museums and tourist attractions, plus a 20 per cent discount on room rates in participating hotels and restaurants, and a 24-hour Hop-On Hop-Off bus ticket.

Walking along **Graben**, admiring some of the old buildings and their unique architecture, we walk past the iconic Plague Column and enter **St. Stephen's Cathedral**, where I find

the interiors and the organ music quite captivating.

St. Charles Church, with its mighty green dome, is another important sacred building and a symbol of Vienna. Passing by the Albertina Museum, I am struck by the beauty of Danubius Fountain.



Lunch is at the classy Café Museum that opened in 1899 and became a meeting place for Viennese artists. Later, Tom gives me a tour of the spectacular Vienna State Opera. At the edge of the old town is Urania, a public educational institute in art nouveau style. That evening, we walk through Spittelberg to explore creative art, and dine at **TIAN Bistro**. All vegetarian and vegan dishes use resources from root to leaf (sourced from local organic farms). Viennese practise mindful eating as well as meaningful living!

The next day, Tom takes me to Schönbrunn Palace, where more grandeur awaits: well-preserved objects from different parts of the world; themebased royal quarters, stunning gardens and gorgeous sculptures. In the Upper Belvedere Palace, the reflection pond mirroring the façade is a show-stopper! That evening, at the 'Strauss and Mozart-Dinner Concert' at Kursalon Hübner. my heart waltzes and pirouettes to the celebrated music. Vienna takes a bow with majestic grace! 🗸

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

#### GYEONGBOKGUNG PALACE

The largest of the city's Five Grand Palaces, it was the main palace of the Joseon Dynasty (1392-1910). You can view artefacts and period costumes on display plus see the re-enactment of palace rituals.



#### CHANGDEOKGUNG PALACE

A UNESCO World Heritage Site, it was built as a secondary palace in 1405. Explore the imposing gate Donhwamun, the main palace building Injeongjeon, and the Secret Garden Huwon—a natural delight.



#### DEOKSUGUNG PALACE

It served as the imperial seat for the Korean Empire, and is one of Seoul's only palaces that can be visited in the evening to witness its lit-up buildings. Deoksugung boasts Korean and western-style neoclassical structures.






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## Tales of Yore

Author, entrepreneur, and motivational speaker **Durjoy Datta** gives us a sneak peek into what he's reading right now

The book I'm reading at the moment is titled The World: A Family History by Simon Sebag Montefiore.

I have read two books—*Jerusalem* and *The Romanovs*—by the same author and I found both these books wildly entertaining. Any history book runs the risk of being just a random collection of events, dates, wars and coups, but the author, like in his earlier books, manages to make it read like a dramatic soap opera, replete with unthinkable twists, gore, violence and delicious back-stabbing.

This time the challenge is steeper because the book considers the world a family. It starts off its history say 5,000 years ago and covers everything you can think of: from the Ziggurats and the Pharaohs to

the Mauryans and the Ottomans. . . you get the drift.

The curated stories are not just a mere recounting of events, but are tales filled with emotions, intrigues, and palpable tensions. You don't just read the events; you live them.

It's a wild, ambitious sweep and the writer gets it right. The aim of the book, I believe, was not to educate but entertain. It picks out the most dramatic sequences in history, mounts them, and paints a visually striking picture of it all. The end result? A history book that resonates with readers on a deeply emotional level, making past events feel immediate and alive. One can't help but be immersed in the vivid world Montefiore presents, marvelling at the intricacies and craziness of our shared human story.

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

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
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# Flavours Of Yesteryears

Embark on a captivating culinary journey at these five globally-revered heritage dining spots—each of them not only offers exceptional gastronomy but also holds profound historical and cultural importance

#### LA TOUR D'ARGENT, PARIS, FRANCE

Serving upscale French cuisine, La Tour d'Argent (translates to The Silver Tower) is a historic restaurant in Paris's 5<sup>th</sup> arrondissement. Spread across five floors, it was built from a stone that shone silver in the light, giving it its name. In 1582, La Tour d'Argent opened as an inn and soon became a favoured dining spot for kings and princes owing to its safety and aristocracy. The tower is located on the banks of the River Seine, at 15 **Quai de la Tournelle**. near **Louvre Museum**.

#### RULES, LONDON, ENGLAND

Founded in 1798, Rules is London's oldest continuously operating restaurant, boasting a rich history. Favoured by British monarchs and the nobility, its legacy spans nine reigns—it is only slightly younger than the USA! Rules has received visits from Charles Dickens, H.G. Wells, and Harrison Ford. The restaurant's royal connections and traditional British fare make it a historic dining destination; its menu lays emphasis on classic English game cookery, along with an offering of oysters, pies and puddings. Rules embodies a cherished culinary experience.







#### WIERZYNEK RESTAURANT, KRAKOW, POLAND

When wealthy merchant Mikołaj Wierzynek hosted a sumptuous feast for the monarchs of Europe on behalf of the Polish King Casimir the Great, in 1364, it started a tradition. Even today, the restaurant has maintained its medieval style of feasts, and its  $14^{\text{th}}\text{-}\text{century}$  royal heritage and classic Polish cuisine draws several illustrious guests. The restaurant has become something of an Old Town landmark.

#### A BRASILEIRA, LISBON, PORTUGAL

Lisbon's oldest and most renowned café, A Brasileira opened its doors on 19th November, 1905, in **Chiado**. Founded by a Portuguese emigrant, this enduring establishment has witnessed numerous eras, political shifts, and pivotal moments in Portugal's history. It has retained its unique character, preserving the memories of countless artists and anonymous patrons over a century. A Brasileira has been offering coffee produced from some of the world's most-awarded coffee beans.

#### VESTIBÜL, VIENNA, AUSTRIA

This upmarket restaurant is housed in the historic **Burgtheater**, a neo-baroque style theatre dating back to 1888. Its 'imperial' rooms were exclusively reserved for Emperor Francis Joseph I and Empress Elisabeth (Sisi) when they attended performances at the **K.K. Hofburgtheater**. You can see the imperial family's coat of arms and the royal couple's initials, while sampling the classic Wiener schnitzel.  $\checkmark$



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


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## Live Like A Maharaja

I heard about the hotel's recently-opened, luxurious Maharaja Suite from several friends and I could not think of a more appropriate place to stay. I was escorted by a most warm and efficient hotel

staff to the suite. As I walked out of the elevator onto the second floor, I could see a distinct red door at a distance. I walked straight to it almost as though a magnetic energy was pulling me.

#### DESIGN HIGHLIGHTS

Walking into the Suite felt as though I was walking into my first Air India flight in 1981, the 747 aircraft called Chandragupt Maurya. I could feel the same positive energy from every corner displaying elements of India's diverse culture; from the walls and drapes to the minute detailing in every piece of furniture in the Hall (lounge), the Chamber (bedroom), the Study, and

the bathrooms. The use of the magnetic red tone helped to highlight every element, however small. The beautiful wallpapers bore an Indian touch with animal motifs and colourful designs. Used in just the right quantity, it acted as a refreshing highlight, lifting the space. The Maharaja Suite means truly living like a Maharaja, in what is a perfect blend of royalty





The Suite has been designed by Bobby Mukherji and Associates.

#### **CULINARY CURATIONS**

A delicious late afternoon lunch at The Chambers

with a view of the Delhi skyline was a delightful experience. Cuisine comes courtesy of Albero, a global kitchen dedicated solely to members and guests of The Chambers. The menu is comprehensive and caters well to all palates. The Crab on Toast is an exceptional blend of flaky, fresh crab and rich, butter smooth pate. It was also impossible to ignore the Grilled Sea Bass accompanied by a divine Admiral Sauce. Both dishes come highly recommended. Hats off to the chef.

But back to nostalgia: two of my all-time favourite restaurants for over 40 years, The House of Ming and Machan, continued to impress me, be it the unique delicacies or the interiors, that have been improvised over time. Being at the Hotel brought back several memories. A day's stay helped me realise how many years had gone by.

No drink is as ubiquitous to India as tea. Here are four concoctions of the beloved beverage from different parts of the country

#### NOON CHAL

The next time you're in Kashmir, try Noon chai or Sheer chai. True to its name—noon means 'salt' in some regional languages—this pink tea has a dash of salt, apparently added to prevent dehydration, a common occurrence in high-altitude areas. The secret ingredient in this tea is soda bicarbonate; when it comes into contact with the tannins in the tea leaves, it produces the distinctive pink hue. Also prevents heartburn and bloating (inevitable when you eat delicious Kashmiri fare)! Available literally everywhere.

#### DARJEELING TEA

Hand-picked and hand-processed,
Darjeeling tea spells innate luxury. A light
golden brew, it is flavourful and aromatic
with hints of fruits and flowers. Darjeeling
tea is known by the names of the gardens
that produce it, and at the top stands
Badamtam's first flush and Makaibari's
Silver Tips Imperial Oolong Tea. The right
way to enjoy this tea is to just let the leaves
steep in hot water, sans milk or sugar. A
great place to savour it is **Glenary's** in **Darjeeling**, with an English breakfast.

#### IRANI CHAL

Legend has it that travellers from Persia came to Mumbai and brought their culinary traditions with them. They eventually fanned out to Hyderabad and Pune where the Irani café culture still stands strong. Brewed with black tea, milk, sugar and *khoya* or *mawa*, the milky Irani chai is best enjoyed with Osmania biscuits in cafés scattered around the **Charminar** in **Hyderabad**. In **Pune**, try the **Irani Café**. Some versions add cinnamon, cardamom, and ginger as well.

#### SULAIMANI MALABAR CHAL

In Arabic, Sulaiman translates to 'man of peace', and it is said that Prophet Muhammad used to have a beverage called *ghava* made with dates and black pepper. It got popular among the Arabs, who tweaked the recipe, and brought it to India. Brewed to a golden colour, this aromatic tea is infused with cardamom, pepper, cloves, and spearmint, and works as a digestive post a rich meal. Try it at **Malabar Café** in **SG Palya**, **Bengaluru**, with Malabari banana fritters for an authentic experience.

#### ♥SHRIVARDHAN BEACH

#### Around 190km from Mumbai

En-route to this beach from Mumbai, take a detour to Tamhini Ghat, a picturesque mountain passage (it would add a few hours, but it is worth a visit). The beach is family-friendly; children can play beach games, ride horsedrawn carts and dig into delicious street food. Eateries here serve authentic Malvani cuisine. Do not forget to try ukadiche modak, a specialty here. Accommodation options include hotels, resorts, and homestays.



If you are at Shrivardhan beach, you may also visit the nearby Harihareshwar and Kondivali beaches located about 20km and 12km away, respectively.





#### **OMURUD-JANJIRA BEACH**

#### Around 157km from Mumbai

Located south of Mumbai, an estimated four-hour drive will take you to **Murud beach**. It comes to life after sunset when vendors gather to sell a plethora of street food along with coconut water and soft drinks. Try the popular pomfret thali at nearby eateries. There are a few accommodation options available, including an MTDC resort. You can also avail a ferry from the **Gateway of India** to **Mandwa**, and from there, take a taxi to the beach.

## King Of The Sky

October 2023 marks the 91<sup>st</sup> anniversary of JRD Tata's inaugural flight

A single-engine Puss Moth aircraft took off from Karachi with a payload of mail for then Bombay, on 15th October 1932, with Bharat Ratna Jehangir Ratanji Dadabhoy Tata in the pilot's seat—a watershed moment in Indian aviation. The country's first flight took off, paving the way for the creation of India's first airline, Tata Airlines (now Air India). On being asked about his life's greatest experience, JRD had said, "The flying experience has dominated... No other can equal the excitement of the first solo flight."

#### INTRODUCING HASSLE-FREE SELF-SERVICES

Air India has become the first Indian carrier to introduce an integrated self-baggage drop and kiosks for self check-in service, for all domestic and select international flights at Delhi's Terminal 3 airport. These seamless digital processes will allow Air India flyers to customise their seating preference (depending on availability), update their Frequent Flyer number, print baggage tags along with boarding passes, and drop off their luggage without queueing up at check-in counters.

While the service is available for all domestic flights and only Australiabound international flights at the moment, Air India plans to extend this to more flights departing to other countries and intends to introduce it at other Indian and international airports too.


#### ELEVATING THE AIRPORT EXPERIENCE

Air India has rolled out Project Abhinandan to provide a personalised and hassle-free onground experience for its guests at airports. Over 100 specially-trained

Service Assurance Officers have been deployed at 16 Indian airports, who will offer on-ground assistance across touchpoints to Air India guests wherever they require it—at check-in area or lounges, near the boarding gates, during transit, or at the arrival hall. They will sense passenger concerns and proactively engage with guests-regardless of the cabin class they are booked in—to provide support, and address problems and unforeseen issues like missed flights, delayed baggage delivery, and misconnections at airports, among others.

#### COLLABORATING FOR SEAMLESS CONNECTIVITY

Air India has signed an interline partnership with Bangkok Airways, which will enable the former's guests to avail convenient connections to 10 destinations across Thailand, Laos, and Cambodia on Bangkok Airways' network via Air India's Bangkok, Hong Kong, and Singapore gateways. Some of the privileges that Air India flyers will have access to include Inter Airline Through Check-In (IATCI) implementation, wherein guests get their boarding passes for the entire travel at the first point of departure, and have their baggage checked-in through to their final destinations. In addition to that, all guests taking connecting flights on Bangkok Airways can also access the airline's Boutique Lounges and Courtesy Corners at available airports. <
